From the President's desk...

I would like to thank the members and the Board for what I deem to be a great honour and privilege to be appointed as the 46th President of this great and honourable Association.

I am also pleased to record the unanimous vote given to Trish Vejby as our Vice President. Trish, who is also the Chair of the Wyndham Branch, has taken over this onerous task from Mark D'Alterio.

Until I joined the Board of the Association, I was vaguely aware of the programs and modernisation taking place. I thought I was not greatly affected by them

because I had attended the refresher course for JPs, and had gone along to the Bail Justice in service training that kept me up to date. So I thought I was doing my bit; little did I know.

Yes, little did I know just how much work is done by the directors, the committees, the branches and membership, let alone the Board itself. As an example, the amount of work, organisation and effort just to bring the training program to you is enormous. The effort by the training team to present training in such a seamless and effortless fashion so

that it looks like it is just a casual meeting between friends, or at least men and women of good will, is staggering.

Just attending Board meetings is hard work in itself, as the individual directors bring to the table the many and varied ideas for improvement and programs that emanate from their branches' committees and own experiences across the state. These meetings are not for the faint hearted and if you are not used to 'robust' discussion or debate then this is not the place for you. Good or bad it all comes to the table in one form or another to make directors aware of what is happening across the state with honorary justices.

The monthly reading and email correspondence file is probably more than I used to do when I was working full time, and although this is probably true of most volunteer organisations however, it often seems that it may have an extra dimension when we are dealing with independent judicial officers. Each member of the Association is indeed just that; with their own independent view of the world, their role in it and what they believe it should be as well as what we as an Association should be doing to enhance that particular view.

As the President and elected leader of our Association, it is my role to listen to all the different independent voices and then in conjunction with the Board take the decisions and put programs and strategies in place that are directed at enhancing the role of honorary justices and the membership within the community. As already stated, honorary justices are independent souls, and rightly so. It is an office and status that must be zealously guarded against all measures that seek to diminish the role or standing, but I, together with the Board, must act with the

best interest of all justices in mind, not just a select few. Even so, sometimes we will get it wrong, but my experience is that mostly we get it right, and we can always change what we get wrong from time to time.

I would like to stress the independence of honorary justices as being one of the hallmarks of the office, and of my commitment, on your behalf, to safeguard it in all forums. Independent people are just that, independent, but unfortunately, this is sometimes conflated with individualism, which we must guard against. Making any type of rules or system is always problematic with

independent people. However, in my mind and attitude it should not be, so long as all views have been taken into account when formulating the policy or program. You, as financial members of our Association are part of this system, and your input is both welcome and vital; whether by participation on one of the many RVAHJ sub-committees, by branch membership, or by nominating for election to the Board of Directors.

We can best serve our community, and the standing of honorary justices through training and education, attending forums with other

justices, and contributing to the Association's committees, branches, programs and rosters whenever time allows.

This year we will see many of the changes your Association has installed become embedded and second nature, as well as some programs we have been promoting with our stakeholders established or adjusted and modified to meet their expectations. Our Immediate Past President Gary Tragardh had the unenviable and somewhat onerous task of implementing new systems and putting membership on the correct financial footing, for which I thank him for not leaving it to me to have to implement. I see this year of the presidency as one of consolidation and fine-tuning, as we get the programs right, based on our experience and feedback from our membership. To this extent I will seek to attend as many branches, hopefully in the company of each Branch Liaison Director, and forums as I can to continue my education and gain first hand knowledge that I can contribute when meeting in committee or with our stakeholders.

I have already introduced myself to the Director, Court Services, Ms Gabrielle Levine, and hopefully will enjoy the cordial relationship she extended to my predecessor. Our conversation centred around the enhancement of relations between the Department of Justice and our Association, and in particular, outstanding matters from 2006, the satisfactory conclusion to which would be a positive start to 2007. Our talk was characterised by us both committing to working together in a manner which will enhance the standing and standards of honorary justices in the community. An invitation has been extended to Gabrielle to provide an occasional article of interest to

members, for inclusion in this journal. Shortly after, I also had a chance to speak with Mr Michael Bourne, Project Director, Court Services, and he was also very complimentary toward my appointment, and also offered his congratulations. All in all, I believe this to be a good start with people we see as partners in our endeavours to provide a more professional service to our community.

Subsequent to these brief conversations, concern was raised that a possible misconception may arise from a previous journal, where a training course was cancelled as the Department of Justice had not provided funding. I can clarify that there had not been any funding arrangement agreed to by the Department of Justice. It had been requested by the Association through the Magistrates' Court. Gabrielle Levine also confirmed to me that there were not 700 JP applications waiting to be processed. I raise these matters of clarification on behalf of our partner in order that we continue to have an open, frank, and trustworthy relationship.

Like my predecessor Gary Tragardh, I would like to see members become involved with planning celebrations for our Centenary in 2010, and invite participation from members across the state. A Steering Committee has been formed to ensure that this momentous milestone is successfully celebrated.

Again, like those before me, I ask individual members to consider participation in one or more of our Committees, where the real work that benefits all members commences. I assure you that you will be made welcome in any role that you choose to be involved in, and as many hands make light work I urge you to participate, where you can.

I am proud to represent the membership of the RVAHJ, which is arguably the largest volunteer organisation of its type in Victoria, and will do so to the best of my ability, with the able and experienced backing of your directors and committee members.

Annual General Meeting of Members 2007

Notice is hereby given that the Annual General Meeting of Members for 2007 will be held on **Thursday**, **31 May 2007** at 7.30 pm at 53 Broadway, Elwood.

Business

- (1) To confirm the minutes of the 96th Annual General Meeting held on Thursday, 4 May 2006.
- (2) To declare the Biennial Election of Directors.
- (3) To consider and, if thought fit, adopt the Annual Report of the Board.
- (4) To consider and, if thought fit, adopt the Balance Sheet and Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ended December 31, 2006.
- (5) To appoint an Auditor for the ensuing year.
- (6) Special Resolutions The following Special Resolutions to change the Constitution have been listed for discussion, having been received prior to the advertised closing time.

Motion 1: That Section 13 of the Constitution be changed as follows:

13.1 Composition of Board

The Board consists of the Directors, who shall be elected from among the Ordinary Members and Life Members of the Association. Additionally provision is made for the elected members of the board to appoint up to two (2) external and non-elected directors to the board.

- (a) External directors may only be appointed by unanimous vote of the board. Such a vote will be taken at a specially convened meeting to confirm or reject appointment.
- (b) External directors shall be appointed for a term of two (2) years, and may, by unanimous vote of the board, have a

second and final term of two (2) years. Under no circumstance may an external director be appointed for a period exceeding four (4) years in totality.

13.2 Number of Directors

- (a) The minimum number of Directors, both elected and appointed, shall be nine (9) and the maximum number of Directors shall be fifteen (15).
- (j) ceases to be a Member of the Association for any reason.
- (k) external directors are exempt from (j) above but shall be automatically required to relinquish office after a term of two (2) years. Such an initial appointment may be extended for a further term only once. Such extension must be by a separate and unanimous vote of the board.

Motion 2: That Section 21 of the Constitution be changed as follows:

- 1.1 The board may appoint a member of the association to act as the treasurer of the association.
- 1.2 If the treasurer dies or leaves the association the board may appoint a replacement.

Proxies

Members may appoint a proxy to act on their behalf at the AGM to attend and to exercise all rights and to discharge all duties, which that Member might have. A proxy must be a member of the Association. Notification, in the approved form, must be received by the Secretary at least 48 hours prior to the scheduled commencement of the meeting. Proxy forms are available from the office.



Justice in the spotlight...

The subject of this edition's 'Justice in the spotlight' is Shirley Smith JP. Shirley was born and raised in Minyip, a small farming community some 300 km northwest of Melbourne. Her life thus far has been wonderfully diverse. She has been an air-hostess, small business owner, community volunteer and mother of three. She has been an honorary justice since 1994 and is a member of the Association's Buloke Branch. She is also a member of the exclusive 'Shirley Club,' an organisation comprised entirely of people named 'Shirley.'

What's it like being a JP in a small town (Minyip) with a population of 480?

Minyip is a very caring community, as all smaller towns are. Everyone knows everyone else, and it is all very friendly most of the time. Members of the community respect the position of JP, so it is an honour to be given the opportunity to be able to help in the role of JP.

You've been known to refer to the Country Women's Association (CWA) as 'Chicks With Attitude.' Please explain.

CWA is often said sarcastically 'Chin Waggers Association.' Well not if us younger members have

anything to say. We now have more dynamic women involved and we think the image of the organisation must change. We are 'Chicks With Attitude' and we enjoy the odd red or two (or white if you prefer). How has the drought affected your Wimmera grain belt community?

Money is not spent as freely, so not only does the drought affect the farming community, but also the businesses. It is affecting us all. Farmers are a resilient lot though, and always say 'next year...' Seeing gardens die, though is rather depressing. We have had droughts in the past, but have always had water.

What can other JPs and RVAHJ Branches less affected by the drought, do to help those stricken by the lack of rain?

Show their concern for those affected.

Are JPs more relevant in small country towns than in larger communities and cities?

Yes, I think so. Small country towns do not have professional people living in their communities who can also witness documents e.g. lawyers, doctors etc. In some small country towns even the policeman is not on duty every day.

Would you encourage young women to seek appointment as an honorary justice?

Definitely yes. I would tell her that it is a great honour to be appointed, and a privilege to be a member of RVAHJ. You are serving your community in a very special way.

Training opportunities

Director (Training and Rosters) Helen Gilhome has announced the Association's 2007 training schedule. Bail Justice training is to be conducted over two days, with the first day addressing bail matters and the second day covering bail issues, Interim Accommodation Orders and relevant legislation.

Ms Gilhome also revealed that, in response to feedback from members, the Association has restructured Justice of the Peace training. The 2007 program is to be divided into two distinct modules to be held on separate days. The first module tackles document witnessing (including State Trustee work) while the second deals with children and young persons

(independent person), search warrants and extension of questioning time.

Ms Gilhome highlighted the importance of appropriate training and urged members to attend the sessions. The Director also noted that the Association receives no funding for Justice of the Peace training or for Bail Justice refresher courses. "We continue to make representations to our stakeholders for the funding of training and we are hopeful, given the hundreds of hours provided by BJs and JPs, that our stakeholders will see the benefit of a professionally trained volunteer force."
