Members,

The Royal Victorian Association of **Honorary Justices** ("RVAHJ") continues the battle of maintaining a strong membership.

Unfortunately, the Department of Justice and Regulation "DOJ&R" no longer assists us in identifying newly-appointed Justices. consequently it is almost by accident that we are able to identify and offer membership to any new appointees.

Although the RVAHJ worked hard, and successfully, to have the status of 'BJ Retired' and 'JP Retired' included into the Honorary Justices Act 2014, it has worked against us for one main reason. The re-certification procedure, which was introduced in an effort to reduce the number of inactive JP's, had the unintended effect of causing many senior, but still active. JP's to resign their appointments. We believe this to be caused by the expectation that they complete a proficiency test of their skills, that the assessment was to be completed electronically and the inclusion of a resignation form with the initial contact from the DoJ&R. The result was that many experienced, and active, JP's found it just 'too hard' and resigned.

The RVAHJ certainly encourages its members to stay abreast of changes and remain skilled in the requirements of their role. To this end, the RVAHJ has been proactive and remains committed in assisting our members during the re-

certification process in order that members not only retain their status, but continue to act as highly competent and dedicated honorary justices in their communities and remain committed members of their association.

Difficulties continue to be present in Victorian Document Signing Centres and with declining numbers, the problem seems to exacerbate. The issue is not assisted by a slow appointment process, particularly when those new appointees are mostly in an age bracket where employment duties render them unable to assist in Document Signing Centres. This year the RVAHJ has had meetings with the Victorian Attorney General's representative, and the Victorian Shadow Attorney General to highlight the issues surrounding the re-certification and recruitment processes.

These meetings have also addressed the very real concern of the removal of Honorary Justices for alleged wrong doings and the RVAHJ has been very proactive to assist its members where ever possible in these instances.

In August this year, the RVAHJ held its Annual Dinner & it indeed was a privilege to honour the many members of our Association for their many years of loyal and committed membership. Although I do not know the exact years of membership I have no doubt the recipients' combined membership years would count in the many hundreds. This, of course, also implies hundreds and hundreds of hours in assisting their respective communities as honorary justices or Bail Justices. I sincerely thank one and all for their dedication and commitment and trust that all are able to continue in their important community role and retain their membership with the RVAHJ. The RVAHJ was delighted to have his Honour Peter Couzens, Chair of the Adult Parole Board, speak at the event and all were transfixed with his address. 🚌



Post-sentence scheme overhaul

he state's most serious violent offenders will be subject to continued detention and supervision even after their prison sentence has expired under tough news laws.

The Serious Offenders Bill is intended to overhaul the post-sentence scheme and will expand it to include serious violent offenders who pose an unacceptable risk of reoffending after the end of their sentence.

The scheme already applies to serious sex offenders and allows courts to make orders for the continued detention of an offender, or to impose rigorous supervision requirements including electronic monitoring, curfews, exclusion zones or residence conditions.

Serious violent offenders captured under the new scheme include those convicted of murder, manslaughter, child homicide, causing serious injury intentionally in circumstances of gross violence, causing serious injury recklessly in circumstances of gross violence, causing serious injury (recklessly or intentionally), kidnapping and arson causing death.

The new laws will also:

Allow for the placement of post-sentence offenders at a new secure facility that is currently under construction in Ararat. Located next to Hopkins Correctional Centre, the facility will provide inten"With these reforms, Victoria is leading the country in managing our most dangerous criminals." ~ Gayle Tierney, Minister for Corrections

> sive treatment and interventions for up to 20 supervision order offenders and is due to open later this year.

Create a new emergency detention order power, allowing supervision order offenders to be detained in prison for up to seven days if they pose an imminent risk of committing a serious sex or violent offence where their behaviour or circumstances change suddenly, even if they haven't breached a condition of their order.

Offenders subject to post-sentence orders will be overseen by the recently established Post-Sentence Authority chaired by former Chief Magistrate and State Coroner, His Honour Judge Ian Gray.

Young parolees subject to tough new laws



arolees as young as 16 could be forced to wear electronic monitoring devices, and subject to drug and alcohol tests regardless of age as a condition of their parole, under tough new laws introduced in July.

Electronic monitoring will be targeted at young offenders who have committed serious offences such as murder, rape, home invasions, car jackings and culpable driving resulting in death.

Minister for Families and Children Jenny Mikakos said the new laws will better protect the community by improving the monitoring of young parolees transitioning back into the community.

Under the legislation, the independent Youth Parole Board will be required to cancel parole if a young offender breaches a condition of parole, such as tampering with a monitoring device or being charged with a serious offence while on parole.

This presumption of cancellation brings the law into line with adult offenders convicted of serious crimes such as sexual offending and serious assault, who then offend while on parole.

Electronic monitoring keeps track of parolees, ensuring they maintain curfew and restrict their movements to certain areas, such as a school or workplace.

"Electronic monitoring will be a constant reminder to some of our most serious young offenders to comply with their orders — if they do the wrong thing, we will know."

The government is providing over \$2 million over two years to trial the scheme. The funding will support infrastructure costs involved in the trial, along with the management of compliance for young people, analysis and evaluation of both schemes.

The trial is expected to launch in the first half of 2019 following the roll out of new technology by Corrections Victoria.

Trials to address family violence

ew and innovative approaches to end family violence and hold perpetrators to account are to be tested.

In August, Minister for Families and Children Jenny Mikakos announced \$4.8 million to trial and evaluate seven new perpetrator intervention programs which target diverse groups.

These trials encourage community-based initiatives and recognise the importance of keeping all perpetrators accountable.

The trials will run until July 2019 and include:

- Bethany Community Support (in the Greater Geelong, Queenscliff and Surf Coast regions) to work with men who have cognitive impairments
- Bendigo and District Aboriginal Cooperative & Centre for Non-Violence (in Bendigo) delivering health interventions, with Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal fathers
- InTouch Multicultural Centre Against Family Violence (in Greater Dandenong) to deliver inlanguage interventions for those from culturally diverse backgrounds

"Unfortunately, family violence is a scourge that knows no boundaries and these new trials acknowledge we have more work to do addressing it in all of our communities.." ~ Jenny Mikakos, Minister for Families and Children.

 Baptcare & Berry Street (in Ballarat and Melbourne) to work with female perpetrators including Aboriginal women.

The new programs respond to Recommendation 87 of the Royal Commission into Family Violence, which urged further interventions for perpetrators beyond the current men's behaviour change programs.

Some sixteen justices of the peace joined members of the Ballarat police for afternoon tea where Inspector Dan Davison thanked the justices of the peace for their roster work at the Ballarat police station where they provide a service to the community signing and witnessing documents.

The number of documents signed at the police station last year was just short of 50,000 making

it the largest number in country Victoria and the third largest in the State.

Inspector Davidson reported that this frees up working police members for their regular duty of policing in the Ballarat area.

Justices of the peace have been practicing since their creation by Richard the Lionheart in 1195. In many places around the world and in some States of Australia, JPs serve on Magistrates courts, saving governments many millions of dollars.

Q&A ~ Asking for ID...Yes or No?

The Mornington Peninsula Branch discussed whether photo ID should be requested when witnessing a Statutory Declaration/Affidavit.

As noted in the May Newsletter from the HJO, there is currently *no legal requirement in Victoria for a Declarant/Deponent to produce ID when making a Stat. Dec./Affidavit. After all, there are many people who would not have photo ID who, nevertheless, are legally entitled to make these documents such as the elderly, the homeless and even children.

If you ask for ID and they can't produce it, you are put in the position of either witnessing the document anyway or refusing to witness the document, for insufficient cause.

When we witness Stat. Dec's./Affidavits, the Declarant/Deponent verbally declares/swears or affirms that they are the person named on the docu-

ment. They will be held accountable, and liable to a charge of perjury, if that statement is false; not the witness.

It would be appropriate however, before proceeding, to *ask* the person if they are the person named on the document and to check that they haven't left out their middle name/s or used a nickname. If so, this should be corrected and appropriately initialled.

It might also be that the person before you is signing on behalf of another, under Power of Attorney, in which case, you should sight the Power of Attorney, confirm their authority and make the appropriate notation on the jurat.

*Note: NSW documents do contain a requirement that the witness sights photo ID and records the details on the form.



Appeal system being modernised

he government is modernising Victoria's appeals system, reducing the burden on victims and witnesses and making appeal processes more efficient.

The Justice Legislation Amendment (Unlawful Association and Criminal Appeals) Bill 2018 will abolish 'de novo' appeals of criminal cases to the County Court.

Currently, when a person is found guilty by the Magistrates' or Children's court and appeals their conviction, the County Court must hear all evidence again and reach a new decision. Essentially, appeals are a new – or *de novo* – hearing.

The current system places a considerable burden on victims and witnesses, who are required to give their evidence again during appeal proceedings. The system also consumes large amounts of County Court time and resources.

The reforms will see conviction appeals decided on transcripts of evidence from the original trial, with further evidence received only if the County Court considers it to be in the interests of justice.

"This is about ensuring that the time and resources of the state's higher courts are used in a more efficient and effective way." ~ Attorney-General Martin Pakula.

An accused will no longer be able to change their plea on appeal without leave under the new laws.

Sentence appeals will also be determined on evidence and materials before the original court and may only be allowed if the County Court considers there is a compelling reason to impose a different sentence. The Magistrate's reasons for the original sentence must be taken into account when considering the appeal.

Additional evidence, material or information relating to matters that occurred after sentencing may also be considered.

De novo appeals against final orders made by the Family Division of the Children's Court will similarly be abolished under the reforms.

Bob gave comprehensive explanations of changes set out in "Take Control" and cleared up any misunderstandings or questions we had. Members showed their appreciation of his time and willingness to share his knowledge.

During General Business a lengthy discussion took place on the directive as to asking for ID when presented with Stat Decs or Affidavits, with

many varied opinions being put forward. Mainly the possible ramifications with the Supreme Court and High Court in the event that a fraudulent document comes to light. Will the JP be the one held responsible? Most agreed that we would be. What assurance or support do we have, should the situation arise? When looking at the overall picture, even though the Dept of Justice has instigated this ruling, has the issue been passed through the Courts?*

Youth outreach program

outh workers and police officers will target and prevent youth offending in Melbourne's north-west and south as part of a 12-month pilot program.

Minister for Police Lisa Neville joined Victoria Police at Werribee Police Station to launch the pilot that will see a police officer paired with a youth worker every night in the Wyndham, Hobsons Bay, Maribyrnong, Greater Dandenong, Casey and Cardinia areas.

The \$1.7 million Embedded Youth Outreach Program pilot is part of the Community Safety Statement 2018-19 and will see Youth Support and Advocacy Service youth workers working with police to identify what services will assist at-risk young people, and they'll also make and case manage referrals.

The program will operate outside business hours when police most commonly encounter at-risk young people. It will not only prevent offending but also hold young people to account for their actions.

The program was funded in the 2018-19 Budget as part of a \$15 million initiative to target youth offending and is in addition to 42 new Youth Specialist Officers, currently rolling out in local communities across Victoria, to divert young people from a life of crime.

There are also more than 90 full-time Youth Resource Officers operating across Victoria, and \$16 million Youth Crime Prevention Grants, helping to address offending behaviour and recidivism by young people.

The government is also establishing Multi-Agency Panels, which bring together schools, community organisations, police and government departments. These panels have assisted a significant number of young people in Wyndham, Melton, Brimbank and Dandenong areas.

Victoria Police's Operation Wayward and Operation Regnant has made over 700 arrests in the past 14 months to crackdown on youth offending. ΔT


