### **Business**

### **2019 Biennial Election of the Board**

Under the Constitution, at least one half of all Board members retire every two years but are eligible for re-election.

Any Ordinary Member or Life Member of the Association may accept nomination in the prescribed form obtainable from the office and all nominations must be lodged with the Returning Officer, C/- PO Box 317, Elwood, 3184 no later than 4.00 pm on Thursday, 31 January 2019.

Nominations must be signed by the proposer and seconder who shall in each case be a Life Member or an Ordinary Member of the Association who is not in arrears with his/her subscription. The consent in writing of the person nominated shall be endorsed on each nomination.

Should the number of nominations exceed the number of vacancies on the Board, then a ballot shall be conducted.

### **Proxies**

Members may appoint a proxy to act on their behalf at the AGM to attend and to exercise all rights and to discharge all duties, which that Member might have. A proxy must be a member of the Association. Notification, in the approved form, must be received by the office at least 48 hours prior to the scheduled commencement of the meeting. Proxy forms are available from the office.



## Victorian state election brings change

**T**he recent state election has seen several changes; we have a new Attorney General for Victoria.

Half the Victorian Cabinet will be women, including our new AG.

Jill Hennessy is the second female attorney-general for Victoria.

She was elected the member for Altona District at a by-election in 2010, then re-elected in 2010 & 2014.

Since the election of the Andrews government in 2014, she has served as the Minister for Health and Minister for Ambulance Services. Previously, she held shadow ministerial roles for Public Transport, Anti-Corruption, Corrections, Crime Prevention and Women.

Before entering Parliament, Ms Hennessy had a number of occupations, including lawyer, community volunteer, legal adviser, Western Health and Western Region Health board member, Chair of the Victorian Working Families Council, adviser to then Premier Steve Bracks, and home-based mum. She has a Bachelor of Laws and Bachelor of Arts from Monash Uni and a Masters of Public and International Law from Melbourne Uni.

Other changes in government include:-

- Martin Pakula MP (former Attorney General) will be the lead Minister for Jobs, Innovation

and Trade. He also adds Sport, Tourism & Major Events, while retaining Racing;

- Luke Donnellan takes on Community Services, Child Protection and Disability Support;
- Emergency Services has been added to Police Minister Lisa Neville's role;
- Ben Carroll will become the Minister for Crime Prevention and for Victim Support. He will also be the Minister for Corrections and Minister for Youth Justice;
- Martin Foley remains as Mental Health Minister; and
- New minister Gabrielle Williams will be Minister for Women and take on Family Violence.

## Committal system review announced

**I**n October, the government announced that it will review Victoria's committal system to help reduce victims' trauma, ensure rights to a fair trial and improve the efficiency of the criminal justice system.

In Victoria, committal proceedings are held before a magistrate to determine whether, in the case of more serious criminal offences, there is sufficient evidence to support a conviction.

In recent years, a number of legislative and procedural reforms have sought to improve the committal process. In addition, the Government has consulted on an early case management model and has received a proposal for reform from the Director of Public Prosecutions.

Under the terms of reference, the Commission will consider best practices for supporting victims and examine:

- whether Victoria should maintain, abolish, replace or reform the current committal system
- opportunities for reform that enable early identification of cases that can be determined summarily, encourage appropriate early guilty pleas, facilitate efficient use of court time and encourage

- parties' proper preparation for trial
- ways of improving early disclosure processes in criminal prosecutions brought in the indictable stream
- if, when and in what circumstances witnesses should be examined prior to trial, including consideration of ways to minimise the need for victims and other vulnerable witnesses to give evidence multiple times
- whether a magistrate should determine if there is sufficient evidence to commit an accused to stand trial and, if so, what test to apply, having regard to the Director of Public Prosecutions' power to directly indict, and
- the impacts of any recommended changes on the all parts of the criminal justice system, and what will be needed to ensure the successful implementation and operation of those changes, including resource implications.
- The Commission will consult widely in undertaking its review, including with courts, government stakeholders, the legal profession and victims' groups.

The review will report back to government in March 2020.

# Contempt of court laws to be reviewed



**A** major review of Victoria's contempt of court laws was announced in October.

The Government asked the Victorian Law Reform Commission to review contempt of court laws and consider whether they need to be modernised to enhance public confidence in the justice system and allow for clearer enforcement.

The Commission's review responds to recommendations made by former Supreme Court Judge Frank Vincent following his review of the *Open Courts Act 2013*. Under the terms of reference, the Commission will examine:

- contempt in the face of the court, such as disrupting or obstructing court proceedings
- sub judice contempt, such as publishing information that could interfere with a court proceeding or a person's right to a fair trial
- juror contempt, such as a juror acting improperly by conducting an unauthorised internet search while participating in a trial
- contempt by breach of court order, such as publishing information that breaches a suppression order
- contempt by scandalising the court, such as an ongoing interference of justice by publishing information casting doubt on the integrity and impartiality of a judicial officer.

The Commission will also examine the *Judicial Proceedings Reports Act 1958*, which restricts reports on certain judicial

proceedings, and consider whether it should be reformed to better align with the Open Courts Act.

The Commission will also assess whether existing penalties for breaching publication restrictions are adequate, and whether the level of fault required to prove these offences is appropriate.

Relevant defences and the process for enforcing penalties will be reviewed.

Consideration will be given to whether temporary restrictions on publication should be introduced to better protect victims at the time that alleged perpetrators are charged with sexual or family violence related offences, drawing on a key recommendation of the Open Courts Act Review.

The Commission will make recommendations about existing suppression orders made before the introduction of the Open Courts Act. The review is expected to be completed by the end of 2019.

## Ballarat

### Bittersweet goodbye

THE Ballarat Police Department is sadly saying farewell to an often overlooked but crucial member of their team.

Bryan Nicholls, who has served at the Ballarat Police Station as Justice of the Peace (JP) for the past nine years, has worked his final day ahead of a move to Western Australia.

"I'm having some mixed emotions about leaving," Mr Nicholls said.

"I'm certainly not going to miss the weather," he laughed. "We've made a lot of fantastic friends here, you can't go anywhere in Ballarat without running into someone."

Mr Nicholls has presided in Ballarat since 1995, first working as an active member of Legacy before becoming a JP.

"I did a lot of work doing pension claims for war widows. We needed a Justice of the Peace available to sign off on those documents so I put my hand up and it only expanded from there."

The feeling of helping those in the community who needed it was Mr Nicholls' biggest motivator.

"I think having people who come in with issues they are unsure about and pointing them in the right direction was always a great feeling."

"For an example, someone came in this morning wanting to sign an affidavit and was pretty unsure about the process. Being able to articulate to her 'this is what you have to do' and talk them through the whole process is what I



want to do. By the end of the chat she was feeling a lot more relaxed and comfortable."

Superintendent Jenny Wilson applauded the efforts of JPs like Mr Nicholls for relieving some of the paperwork pressure put on officers, allowing them to focus on front line police work.

"I'd hate to think about the thousands of documents Bryan has signed in his time here," Superintendent Wilson said.

"I remember when I was working as an officer in Carlton, it was our job to work through these documents, so having someone like Bryan to take some weight off our shoulders and allow us to better serve the community is crucial."

Superintendent Wilson also thanked Mr Nicholls for returning to community service even after coming home from the Vietnam War.

"He has provided strong leadership and friendship to his colleagues. I'm thanking him not just on behalf of Victoria Police but on behalf of the Ballarat community as well."

## **New counter-terrorism laws**

**N**ew, stronger counter-terrorism laws have now commenced.

The *Justice Legislation Amendment (Terrorism) Bill 2018*, the bulk of which commenced October 1, allows for preventative detention of terror suspects by police for up to four days, creates a presumption against bail and parole for those who pose a terrorism risk, and clarifies police powers to use lethal force.

The new laws implement key recommendations made by the Expert Panel on Terrorism and Violent Extremism Prevention and Response Powers, led by former Chief Commissioner of Police Ken Lay and former Court of Appeal Justice, the Honourable David Harper.

Police are now able to detain terror suspects without a court order or a warrant for up to four days. Children aged 14 or above may also be detained for up to 36 hours.

Previously a terrorist act had to be imminent for preventative detention to occur. These laws allow for detention to occur if a terrorist act is capable of being carried out and could occur within 14 days. Police are also able to question people subject to preventative detention.

There are now presumptions against bail and parole for people who pose a terrorism risk – not just those who have been convicted of terrorism offences. Only a court can consider bail for those posing a terrorism risk.

The new laws address 21 recommendations of the Expert Panel review.

The laws also streamline the authorisation of special police powers and create new powers to take control of premises. Special police powers include the right to search people and vehicles, enter and search premises, cordon off areas and request proof of identity.

The changes to special police powers also see Protective Service Officers (PSOs) able to work alongside police officers and to keep the community safe in the event of a terrorist incident.

The reforms also clarify Victoria Police's powers to use lethal force in response to a life-threatening act where it may be the last opportunity to safely and effectively intervene. These reforms deliver on the first phase of reforms recommended by the Expert Panel, with work underway to progress the second phase of reforms.

# Tales from the trenches!



**W**e often hear stories, or get questions, about interesting things that come up at roster venues. Here are just a couple...

From David Tolstrup JP—Boroondara DSS

A very nice woman came in armed with two full versions of completed Powers of Attorney documents, one for each of her elderly parents. She had three copies of each intending to have the copies certified. She was very apologetic about the amount of work and said that if it was too much she would understand if I only certified one or two of each document. I advised her that I had no problem doing all six.

Before setting to work, I checked to see that all was in order and found two problems with the original documents:

- 1) On the signing pages, the document was undated, so I advised her there was no point me certifying an uncompleted document and then, here comes the concerning part;

Colleen and some colleagues were faced with the prospect of individually checking and certifying around 1000 pages, twice, (yes, 2000 pages!) of documentation from Canada attesting to the academic credentials of a physiotherapist who is in Australia as a research fellow studying for a PhD.

“The Australian Physiotherapy Association (APA) initially required all his documents (which included course modules from every year of study along with CVs of his teachers) to be certified. Daunting, to say the least. We certainly would not have been able to do it in a single shift, and even if several of

- 2) The document had been witnessed by a Pharmacist as the “authorised” signatory. The other witness was another person.

The woman was aghast when I advised her that I thought the document was invalid and that the signing and witnessing process needed to be done again.

Whilst the woman was really annoyed at the outcome of her visit, she was also very grateful for this anomaly being brought to her attention as quite possibly, when it becomes necessary to rely on the PofA, it would have been invalid and all too late. It is quite conceivable that another (or same) Pharmacist, etc. could just have signed certified copies and she would have been none the wiser!

us were to get together, it would have become very unwieldy, primarily because he had spent a long time arranging the documents in a specific order to meet APA specifications so that the panel assessing them would be able to follow them chronologically/academically.”

After a bit of to-ing and fro-ing, the APA accepted an appropriately worded Stat. Dec. as sufficient proof that the documents were indeed copies of the original.

The client expressed his gratitude for the service provided, however, he did inform Colleen that he may just be the **first of several** more physios coming from Canada!
